#### 25TH HUGH JASCOURT FOUR-MILER MARKS LOCAL MILESTONE AS BUNION #1

A local area milestone was achieved in running June 5 when the Hugh Jascourt 4-mile event was held in East Potomac Park—for the 25th consecutive year. Jascourt, a long-time WRC member, was a founder of the D.C. Road Runners Club back in 1961, when John Kennedy was newly installed in the White House and when running was still punishment rendered by gym teachers who also doubled as drivers education instructors in high school.

Much of this was lost in the pre-race excitement, however, as about 250 runners blasted away in the heat around Hains Point. Darrell General easily outran everybody else to finish in 19:39, a time that has generally won the race through years past, but off the mark that Cliff Karthauser set in 1977 when he ran 19:17 under torrid conditions.

WRC finishers fared well in the results. Jack Cleland finished third, in 20:52, trailing PGRC's Adam Bean who was second in 20:34. Gust 'Iron Man' Svenson won the master's division by finishing a strong (what else?) sixth overall in 21:33. Gust, whose exercise diet consists of a minimum of 100 chinups daily and 100-mile weeks, won a \$50 certificate, as did race winner General.

In the women's division, Kara Mullen of Seekonk, Massachusetts, edged out Louise Mallet of the famed Mallet family. Mullen was 25:10—two seconds ahead of Ms. Mallet. Valerie Nye won the women's master's division, in 28:11, with sixth overall like her male counterpart "Iron Man" Svenson.

The Mallet family won the unofficial family award. Bill Mallet finished ninth overall, with his mother, Joan, also ninth in the women's division.

After the race, Hugh Jascourt *lui-mème* gave a brief explanation about how the founding of the DCRRC came about by a group of hearty runners who sought to form a club to nurture running. The club wound up as an example for other city chapters to follow and established several precedents. It is not surprising that two area runners—Jeff Darman and Henley Gibble—have served terms as president of the national Road Runners Club of America. Mrs. Gibble is the incumbent president.

#### NEWSLETTER EDITORIAL BOARD PROBES ALLEGATIONS OF MOB INFLUENCE ON STAFF

#### BUNION DERBY #2 HITS HIGH WATER MARK IN SPLASH PERFORMANCE AT CARDEROCK

WRC's Jack Cleland demonstrated that patience can be a racing virtue as he swam through the field to win the second DCRRC Bunion Derby race over teammate John Walsh at Carderock June 12. Cleland, who was caught in the pack at the start of the race on the narrow C&O Canal Towpath, worked his way toward the front runners but still found himself 15 seconds in arrears of the leaders at the halfway mark.

John McGrail of Arlington took command early in the second half, but finally was caught by Walsh near the four mile mark under soggy conditions that clearly favored the chasers rather than the chased. But Walsh failed to hold the lead when challenged by Cleland a mile later and the Harvard Law student eased away to an eight second victory in 32:45.

Early leader Darryl Stewart (WRC-Fleet Feet) forced to stop after two miles in the very heavy going came back to finish fourth (35:00) and WRC runners Robert Rodriguez and Jack Coffey finished 5th and 6th, respectively.

After 90+ degree temperatures and high humidity earlier in the day rain began falling on the course just before race time. Mixed with the sandy gavel and red clay surface of the towpath the rain quickly made footing treacherous. But the marginal conditions also made for some very interesting racing. At the front the lead changed four times during the second half of the race while further back positions changed frequently as some runners experienced difficulty with footing or suffered from a fast early pace.

In the women's race WRC's Mary Alico was first across the finish line, but as at the Uptown 8k where she had beaten Marianne Dickerson, Ms. Alico once again ran as a bandit. Official winner, and picking up 20 points in the Bunion Derby Series was NOVA's Kathy Ventura-Merkle (39:37). Second place went to Kathy Hibbert in 41:30, while Suzy Rainville-Coffey continued her recovery from last year's knee injury and marriage to WRC prez Jack with a third place All WRC members wishing to compete on club teams at the Philadelphia Distance Run this September should send their entry forms to John Walsh, 2827 28th St. N.W., Washington, D.C. 20008. Walsh has additional entries if you need them.

#### CLELAND POSTS SECOND STRAIGHT BUNION DERBY WIN AT FT. DUPONT

Jack Cleland altered his tactic but came up the same result he had achieved two weeks earlier at Carderock in winning the third race of this year's Bunion Derby series, sponsored by DCRRC. Unlike the earlier C&O Canal towpath contest at Ft. Dupont Park in Southeast Washington Cleland went with the leaders from the start and never let anyone else control the pace.

A small pack of Cleland, fellow WRC runners Darryl Stewart and John Walsh, and John McGrail exchanged the lead frequently through the first of two loops of the wooded and hilly course before first Stewart, closely followed by Cleland surged to the front. Stewart failed to take control, however, and near the halfway mark of the Mystery Distance race (approximately 5.5 miles) Cleland gained a lead he would not relinquish. John McGrail moved to second as Stewart slumped badly, falling back to fourth place. But McGrail and Walsh had their own problems with the hills and turns their second time over the two loop course and despite falling 15-20 sec. behind the lead Stewart rallied strongly over the last mile to finish just :09 in arrears of Cleland's winning 30:20.

Kathy Hibbert's early series dominance continued as she posted her second consecutive win (36:32) in the women's half of the field.
