EMMONS DOMINANT AT STROH'S 8K: WRC'S EASTMAN BATTLES FOR 2ND

"There is nothing so rare ..." as a mild late June morning in Washington and former Oregon runner Jasen Emmons took advantage of the unusually cool and dry conditions on June 28 to romp to victory in the annual Stroh's 8k road race in downtown D.C. After a fire drill type start that saw the field narrow to half from the full width of Pennsylvania Ave. in one block, Emmons led a group of six through a 4:54 first mile before taking sole possession of the lead with a 4:48 to the two-mile mark that left him with a 100 meter edge.

Among those in the following group was WRC's Jim Eastman who had won this race a year ago. There would be no repeat of that performance this day, however, as Emmons was more than up to the task of leading and pulled away from his pursuers steadily to finish over one minute ahead of Eastman.

Over the last half of the race Eastman's runner-up spot was threatened by Glenn McDonald of Fairfax, who ran just off the WRCer's right shoulder. The Air Force Captain was up to the younger runner's challenge and sprinted to a final two-second advantage (25:22).

Leading the second five of the race after a very strong performance in the race's second half was newly-minted master's runner Lucious Anderson (25:49) who has yet to flush out any serious challengers among the local over-40 crowd. Anderson started the year with a quick 2:31:20 marathon clocking at Shamrock in Virginia Beach last March and hasn't let up since.

Leslie Cooper of Washington (29:19) led the women's half of the draw from the start, but recent high school graduate Amy Colvin was coming on strong at the end, closing to within 12 seconds.

A WRC crew that included Kevin Kolakowski, Pat Bullinger, Jack and Suzy Coffey, Dan Rincon, Patty McGovern, Coleen Troy and several others showed up to help Colonial Running with post-registration, their stipends going to the WRC treasury.

WRCers BEGIN ANNUAL BUNION DERBY QUEST AT JASCOURT AND CARDEROCK ROAD RAMBLES

Once again Washington Running Club members came out in droves to begin their yearly ritual pursuit of DCRRC Bunion Derby age group titles at the Hugh Jascourt "Living Legend" Four Miler June 7 in East Potomac Park.

Top overall honors and course record awards of \$25 each went to WRC's Pat Bullinger (22:30) and

Darrell General (19:08). Bullinger was unchallenged among the distaff runners while a pack of six runners cruised through the first mile in 4:50 before disintegrating, and General raced on ahead of Larry Fredericks and "the Count" in pursuit.

The real action in the Bunion Derby is in the age group and grudge match categories and the Jascourt race provided plenty of stimulus in these categories

Patrick 'Rocco' Carr earned his first win of the year over his erstwhile adversary and pub-crawling chum Ed 'Doughman' Doheny. 'Rocco' applied what appeared to be a sit-on-his-shoulder strategy until just past the three mile mark. But when 'Doughman' eased in behind fellow masters runner Faye Bradley (GNATS), 'Rocco' sped past both of them and pulled away to follow WRC mate Steve Daniels across the line.

With the division of age groups into five year increments this year more races have been created. but it remains to be seen whether the competition will remain as intense as past summers. "The Count," for one, is already convinced that no one in the 35-39 cohort will challenge him. "Who shall dare challenge my regal majesty," he declared while wrapping himself in a fuschia cape after a 19 point performance at the "Living Legend" race.

Several days later at the Carderock 10k, second stop on the Derby circuit, "the Count" added another twenty points with a 33:13 time good enough for third place overall. His age group win staked him to take an early season lead over commoner John Walsh, 4th in 33:28, who when apprised of "the Count's" earlier comment disparaging challengers responded bluntly, "regal majesty, my ass." QUINN WINS FORT DUPONT BUNION RUN AFTER INTRA-CLUB BATTLE IS AVOIDED

Following a pre-race personality clash between two WRC members who will remain nameless, the season-long Bunion Derby points battle continued June 24 at Fort Dupont Park with the DCRRC's annual Mystery Distance Race.

Neither of the combatants was available for comment following the incident, but after vigorous interrogation former WRC Newsletter editor Don Pedro admitted he had witnessed the events. Don Pedro who said, "Gee, I don't understand it, they're both 'great guys' " told this correspondent — while his arm was twisted — that the two club members seemed to disagree about certain characteristics of one another's parents. He added, "I didn't even know they knew each others families."

Dan Quinn added another 20 points his total in the 25-29 age group with his second consecutive win and John Walsh (39 points) pulled within one point of "the Count" in the 35-39 group. "The Count," apparently, was unable to retrieve his cape from the dry cleaners and failed to appear.

Well along the comeback trail now, Jack Coffey garnered top point honors in the 30-34 group, moving himself among the leaders after three races.

As usual the masters division was hard-fought, with Pete Nye finishing 8th overall after passing Eamonn McEvilly well into the second half of the race. Nye turned in a time of 32:40, seven seconds ahead of McEvilly. Bill Wooden was another ten seconds in arrears in 10th place. Eight masters, five of them with WRC, finished in the top 20 overall.

For the first time in recent memory J.J. Wind failed to take the early lead at Fort Dupont. Unaware of the traditional deference shown to J.J., who likes to use his kick while he is still fresh, Dan Quinn went right to the lead that he never relinquished.

This race also marked the long awaited series debut of Betty Blank, fresh off a triathlon season highlighted by a 3rd place performance at the Oxford Md. competition. Following her 2nd place finish this evening she regaled her post-race dinner companions with anecdotes from multisport exploits and trenchant comments on the local running and social scenes.

It was an exciting evening all around.

Jim Hage ripped through the final 10K of Grandma's Marathon in 32:00 and took 2nd place with a 2:16:33. Although Hage was more than four minutes behind the leader at the 20-mile mark he was closing fast when he ran out of race, finishing twenty-seven seconds behind winner Dan Schlesinger. Bruce Coldsmith finished in 2:20:00.93, which was rounded off to 2:20:01. Coldsmith intends to appeal to the Olympic Trials Committee to see if they will accept his time as qualifying.

Ex-WRCer Patty Peoples, who has moved from running to competitive cycling, took 8th place in the Washington Trust Classic at Spokane, Washington. Peoples rides for the Winning-Peugeot team.

WRC's standout high school runner **Greg Early** easily won the Maryland Games Boys' 3,000 and 5,000 meter races. Early ran 9:08 for the 3,000 and 16:20 for the 5,000. Greg has also been selected by *Scholastic Coach* magazine and Gatorade for the Circle of Champions Award. He was named the High School Boys Track Athlete of the Year from Maryland. Only one athlete is selected from each state, so this is quite an achievement.

Don't look for **Patty McGovern** at the local races for a couple of months. Five steps into a training run McGovern heard something snap in her foot and felt a sharp pain. Ignoring the discomfort she ran four miles of her workout until the pain was a little too much, even for her. An X-ray revealed a fractured bone that necessitated a leg-cast. BULLINGER, EASTMAN SYNCOPATE COMPETITION AT BLUES ALLEY RUN

WRCers Jim Eastman and Pat Bullinger both cut short the hopes of any pretenders when they stepped to the starting line for the June 13 running of the Blues Alley 10k at West Potomac Park.

Bullinger had the race's other women conceding victory even at the starting line where several of her competitors were seen gesturing toward the demurely clad front runner and shaking their heads in acknowledgment that they were competing for runner-up honors. When the starting flag dropped they had no reason to change their assessments as a 5:35 first mile opened a wide gap on any pursuers. Her final margin of 2:15 over clubmate Donna Elliot was a fair measure of her dominance. Elliot's 2nd place time of 38:39 was a seasonal best for her, and an indication that perhaps she is ready to up from her recent 23rd place ranking among local women road racers.

Eastman (32:03) encountered just a bit more resistance in the men's draw as a revived Coty Pinckney

chased the Air Force officer through the first five kilometers. Pinckney, severely troubled by leg miseries for the last year, couldn't hold the pace after running the Carderock 10k three days earlier — where he also finished second — and fell back quickly after the midway point, finishing in 32:40.

A bit further back Kevin Kolakowski of WRC was en route to posting a season, and lifetime best for the 10k distance. Following up on his 38:19 p.r. at the Fritzbe's race last month, Kevin trimmed nearly another full minute from his best mark, finishing in 37:27. Good progress for a guy who had never been under forty minutes until 1987.

BUNION DERBY STANDINGS AFTER FIRST THREE RACES

With the Hugh Jascourt 4-Miler, the Carderock 10K, and the Fort Dupont Mystery Distance completed, the picture is still not clear as to who is going to win the coveted age-group awards in the Bunion Derby and go on to fame, fortune, and physical breakdown.

At the moment WRC has the lead in six divisions: the Men's 30-34 (Coffey), 35-39 (Wind), and 40-44 (Trost), and Women's 25-29 (Bullinger), 30-34 (Rainville-Coffey), and 50+ (Mallet). The Club's greatest depth seems to be in the 40-44 group where the first five runners belong to WRC, followed by the top three in the 30-34, and three of the top four in the 30-39 division.

This is the first year that DCRRC has tried a 5-year age groupings. Also, the awards have been extended for the men's 40-44 and 45-49 age groups to include the top five runners in the series, rather than the top four as was previously announced.
