

# 36-to-1 Shot Wins l'Arc; Navratilova Beats Austin: Roundup

Gold River, a 36-to-1 shot ridden by Australian Gary Moore, was the surprise winner of the \$618,000 renowned Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe, the richest horse race in Europe, at Longchamp race track in Paris yesterday.

Another unheralded horse, Bikala, ridden by Serge Gorli, came in second, edging third-place April Run, with Philippe Paquet aboard, in a photo finish.

Gold River's trainer, Abe Head, thus scored his fourth Arc victory. The 4-year-old filly also won the Prix de Cadran in May. Gold River earned \$360,000 for her win.

Moore's father, George Moore, won the Arc de Triomphe in 1959, riding Saint Crespin.

The two favorites, Detroit and Akarad, finished out of the money.

Martina Navratilova brought Tracy Austin's 28-match winning streak to an abrupt halt last night by winning the \$125,000 U.S. Women's Indoor tennis championships, 6-0, 6-2, at the Met Sports Center in Bloomington, Minn.

Navratilova broke Austin's service six times to extract a measure of revenge for last month's three-set loss to Austin in the final of the U.S. Open.

Navratilova picked up a \$22,000 first-place check for the match, which lasted only 51 minutes. That brought her yearly earnings to more than \$477,000. It also was the seventh tournament victory for Navratilova this year, but her first since May, when she won the Tournament of Champions in Orlando, Fla.

Mike Trainer, lawyer for welterweight champion Sugar Ray Leonard, denied a wire-service report from Kenya last night that Leonard had signed a contract for a rematch with Ayub Kalule, the man Leonard took the World Boxing Association middleweight title from in Houston last June.

"No truth at all to this. Totally false," Trainer said. "We haven't even given Kalule a thought. Kalule

has never come up in the conversation. There are many rumors about Ray's next fight, but not about Kalule. Ray is going to defend his title early next year against someone in the top 10 but we haven't zeroed in on anyone. He will have to fight Pipino Cuevas sometime in the near future because he is the No. 1 challenger and Ray would like to fight him. But there may be a fight before that against someone in the top 10."

The Reuter report quoted Kalule as saying that he had signed a contract to fight Leonard within the next six months.

Jeff Peterson, 23, of Fairfax easily outdistanced a field of 1,900 at Hains Point yesterday to win the fourth annual National Symphony Orchestra 10-kilometer run in a meet record time of 30 minutes 30 seconds.

Peterson's Washington Running Club teammate, Dan Rincon, 26, of Wheaton finished second in 31:20. It was his third straight second-place finish in the event.

Laura DeWald, 24, of Arlington won the women's division in a meet

record time of 36:03. DeWald, who used the race as preparation for a marathon she will run in Ohio next week, was far ahead of second-place finisher Hideko Pirie, 36, of Fairfax.

The United States completed a shutout of Australia when John McEnroe downed Peter McNamara, 9-7, 6-0, and Roscoe Tanner beat Mark Edmondson, 3-6, 6-2, 6-3, in the semifinals of the Davis Cup tennis championships in Portland, Ore. The Americans had clinched the best-of-five series by winning the doubles Saturday.

McEnroe, the No. 1-ranked player in the world, never lost a set in his three matches against the Australians, including his doubles effort with Peter Fleming on Saturday.

Maryland tied visiting North Carolina State, 0-0, in double overtime yesterday in an Atlantic Coast Conference soccer game. The Wolfpack (7-1-1, 0-1-1), who came into the game averaging just under five goals a game, were held scoreless for the first time this season, by sophomore Kenny Wilkerson.
