JANUARY ELECTION MEETING

We will hold our annual election meeting on January 23 at the Washington Squash Racquets Club. Mark this date on your calendar and plan to come! Brooks deal: A committee formed of those who had expressed an interest, met before the regular meeting on this issue. This committee accepted a resolution as follows: (1) approve the allocation of shoes and equipment to coordinators of races (Bradley, Baldino, Naylor, Sullivan, Hubbard and Spencer) plus Bob Thurston for his work with the newsletter; (2) find some way to distribute the remaining shoes & equipment (a lottery was mentioned); (3) any future shoes or equipment arrangements to be reviewed by the committee.

All of this was reported in the general meeting, and Ray presented the \$1250 check from the Brooks race to treasurer Dan Rincon.

WRC- Three Cheers! Ray saw Bernie Allen, Mike Greehan and Sheldon Karlin at the Peace Race in Youngstown, Ohio. From their comments and Ray's observations, WRC is the most organized of all the east coast clubs, including Allegany, Greater Boston, Central Park AC, Atlanta TC, Millrose, etc.

Race equipment: Ray has purchased a Chronomix. We will operate it and will also provide a back-up timing system for \$100 rental plus concessions.

Dues structure: Ray proposed that (1) as of Nov. 1 to end of each year, dues be payable for the following year; (2) from Sept. 1 to Oct. 30, dues be \$5 for remainder of calendar year; and (3) from Jan. 1 to Aug. 31, dues be \$10 as at present. All this passed. Ray also proposed that any inactive member should pay back dues for 1 previous year before they become active members, but this proposal was defeated.

1. Bob Thurston restated his proposal that someone make a WRC banner for use at races as a place to congregate. Mark Johnson and his friend Lisa volunteered to make a large sign in time for the Md. Marathon. Phil Stewart has information ab-

Laura DeWald took top honors in this ace: her lith overall 1:59:16 not only roke the previous women's record by 22 minutes, but it made her the third "man" on the winning WRC team! The other 2 were new member Bill Wooden, 2nd overall in 1:52:20, and almost new member Kit Nacy, 3rd in 1:53:00.

Karen Sullivan's 2:14:30 was also under the old women's record (somehow that doesn't sound just right—sorry, Karen).

Dave Dance ran 2:05:48 for 21st, and Jay Wind ran 2:28:57.

Dan Rincon's 30:43 took 2nd in this race; 1st was Georgetown U's John Eberle, in 30:35. 


